

- Personal details and additional information includes funding, scholarships and residential options .
- Choices can choose up to 5 options in no order.
- Education all grades you have received from secondary school onwards and predicted grades.
- Employment information on any paid part or full-time job.
- Statement your personal statement.
- Reference a written recommendation from a teacher or tutor.
- View all details before you pay and send the application £28.50

- Maximum of 4000 characters or 47 lines
- Free form
- One place to focus on relevant skills, achievements and work experience

What universities see now...

While discovering undergraduate courses to pursue at university, my search aimed to find one with its foundation and primary subject, Chemistry, with the application of life science and Biology incorporated. This would be the ideal composition since Chemistry is a subject I consider a dear friend. No matter the increasing complexity of its syllabus, I have had some constant reassurance over the years that I would eventually understand the concepts. This description aligned well with that of the MPharm program. In the last year, the more I have researched into a career as a pharmacist, the more I have grown to feel a sense of belonging. Being a pharmacist presents an opportunity for me to be a next-door medical helping hand, a trustworthy, approachable assistant the patient can rely entirely on to help them safely and effectively use medicines. As a pharmacist, I will bridge the doctor to the patient, simplifying medicine plans to each patient's understanding. Pharmacy will allow me to contribute to people's good health and well-being and to be a small but significant part of their lives. This profession will not only encourage me to dive deep into and explore the structures, formulations and dispense of clinical drugs; it is also a medium to build valuable relationships as I will advise and guide the patient at every step to ensure that they are comfortable consuming the prescribed medicines. At four, my family moved from Dubai to Madagascar. This beautiful country had an extraordinary tropical atmosphere, and we spent six years isolated from the rest of the urban and evolving world. We were always surrounded by raw and grounded natives who have significantly influenced my outlook on life and continue to inspire me to date. Their simple lifestyle and pure innocence bridged our differences. They welcomed us with open arms and considered us amongst their own. Since returning to Dubai, relating to the typical teenager here has been challenging. Translating my unusual upbringing to my peers has been a hurdle in forming friendships. As a Pharmacist, I would be able to befriend various people regardless of their age or background and provide medical care with the same welcoming, wholesome attitude that I received in my childhood, which every patient deserves. I have adapted well to the British curriculum and consistently progressed since Year 10. I was granted a scholarship of \$2,585 from my school for my academic performance and an award for outstanding achievement in Chemistry. I was also recognized as a Pearson Edexcel High Achiever for receiving Grade A in 3 subjects in International AS levels. In October 2024, I was accepted for an Observership program by Unilabs Middle East. It was a five-day program where I shadowed the lab technicians in their five departments: molecular biology, microbiology, chemistry and immunology, and serology and histopathology. I had the opportunity to witness how an RT-PCR test is conducted on blood and urine samples to indicate the presence of some viruses (e.g., HPV) and how bacterial cultures are grown to be identified and tested with antibiotics. I saw the machines used to find the CBC and chemical components such as ion levels of blood samples and the examination of tissues such as breast tissue for a tumour. This experience has provided me with a lot more knowledge of the use of technology in healthcare and the practical skills necessary to excel in the MPharm course.

What I look forward to most during the program is working in a simulated environment where my professional practice skills will be tested thoroughly. Through work placements, I will be aware of the day-to-day situations handled by expert pharmacists, ensuring a smooth transition when I start working as a registered pharmacist.

It would be an honour to play a small role as a pharmacist in developing the rapidly evolving healthcare field and a privilege to make a difference for the betterment of those around me.

You are never more than 70 miles (or 113km) away from the sea in the UK, although you might have to travel a little further to find views like this!



Section 1: Why do you want to study this course or subject?



Students' opportunity to show interest and passion, conveying their knowledge and experience



Motivations for studying the course



Knowledge of this subject area and interests (if they have not studied before, show research)



Future plans and why this is a good fit



Section 2: How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject



Focus on **relevant or transferable** skills they've gained from their formal education



Include any relevant educational achievement like winning a national competition, serving as a student ambassador, lead role in a play



Essays, projects or EPQs



Private lessons, tutoring or online courses



Section 3: what else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?



Include work experience, employment or volunteering to demonstrate transferable skills related to the course



Personal life experiences or responsibilities



Hobbies and any extracurricular or outreach activities



Achievements outside of school or college





is a private, fee-paying school, which is part of a small group of independent ESTABLISHMENT DETAILS Our school was founded in 1985 and offers education to pupils aged 2 - 18+. We currently have over 800 students enrolled in schools in including 47 students aged 11+ in the Boarding House. We have 61 countries and 36 first languages represented in our classrooms. We are a non-selective coeducational school, focusing on the positives of each individual student and fostering their abilities and talents. The schools' curricula are based in the National Curriculum for England and the International Baccalaureate Programmes: the IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) and the IB Career-related Programme (IBCP). We offer 25 Diploma Programme courses, as well as the Pearson International BTEC Diploma as part of the IBCP.Predicted grades are calculated in Year 13 based upon the following data: performance in mock exams (based on official past papers from the IB), completion of subject Internal Assessments and Individual Orals (submitted coursework that counts towards the final IB grade). Prediction for the IB Diploma Core are based on teachers' assessment of the student's work in line with published IB assessment criteria. Summary of our thoughts

University perspective

- Easier for us to find what we are looking for
- Gives more opportunity for students to be direct with experiences
- Gives students a structure to work within when they are unsure

Counsellor perspective

- Structured approach promotes clarity and focus
- Encourages authenticity and self reflection
- Reduces pressure on students to 'perform' and create a narrative
