Each country or region has specific language, curriculum, exam, and visa requirements that we must be aware of to guide students effectively.

Entry Requirements

- Students (and parents) don't always realize that the student will need to have studied specific subjects depending on the course they apply to.
- Some universities might have language proficiency test waivers while others will require a language proficiency exam.
- It can be hard to keep track of which universities have unique exam requirements or require standardized test scores.

Application Timelines

- Make sure student knows the specific deadlines for each institution.
- Suggest that the student make a spreadsheet to keep track of everything
- Remember that nothing is standardized.
- Help students plan out their work schedule as international timelines do not always align with curriculum demands.
- There are early application deadlines (Oxbridge, Bocconi, U of T), regular deadlines, and rolling. It will take time for the student to track them all down.

Offer Dates and Enrollment Deadlines

- When a student has clear priorities in regards to where they want to study, they can more easily build an application submission timeline.
- Students must keep offers and enrollment (or deposit) deadlines in mind to build a strategy of when to submit each application. If not, a student might receive an offer that requires a faster, or larger, deposit than their family is willing to commit to.

Final Words of Wisdom

- Keep an eye on global politics. Events will affect college lists.
- Know the cultural "norms" of your families (family time, plagiarism, contract negotiations)
- An international student population does not equal diversity. Research! Are there strong ethnic or cultural concentrations to be aware of?
- Form strategic partnerships with local consultant or counselor if you lack knowledge.

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ARGENTINA

HS graduation: DEC University start date: MAR/APR



- Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution
- Admission release dates: By law, students who meet the basic requirements can study for free at any public uni
- Admissions deposit dates: ASAP
- Typical language exams: B2 Spanish

Entry requirements: - Public unis: no national exam; certain programs may require an entrance exam, interview or portfolio (medicine or arch, as examples); compulsory foundation year for UBA; Private unis: require preparatory courses with final entrance exams. May be direct admission for students with exceptional academic records.

Typical time to secure student visa: one month

Common pitfalls: Student must complete certain paperwork to enter Argentina (criminal record certificate, university acceptance letter, and address); English-language programs are rare



BRAZIL



HS graduation: DEC (majority); JUN (int'l private schools)

University start date: FEB (all courses); AUG (not all courses and not all universities)

Typical admissions deadlines: NOV; MAY (non-IB students) or JUL (only for IB students)

Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution

Admission release dates: DEC/JAN; JUL

Admission deposit dates: 1 wk (student must look at their Edital which is the document with all admission process rules) Typical language exams: Vestibular

Entry requirements: Vestibular and ENEM (Brazilians); Processo Seletivo Internacional: IB/SAT/BAC/ABITUR (int'l)

Typical time to secure student visa: 1 wk

Common pitfalls: Law and medicine must be studied in Brazil in order to practice later (although they can later be consultants). For law, there is one agreement with Portugal for validation in Brazil. Engineering studied outside of the country is difficult to validate in Brazil but foreign-educated engineers can work as consultants in companies.

Other info: FGV: Business School - most prestigious (all programs in English); PUC-PR: American Academy - dual degree programs with Kent State University

Note: Students can withdraw a deposit and re-deposit elsewhere. They will get some kind of refund but not 100%.

CHILE



HS graduation: DEC

University start date: MAR

Typical admissions deadlines: Tied to PAES testing (happens 2x/yr in July and December). Students apply in specific rounds based on their scores and preferences

Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution

Admission release dates: 3-6 wks after application

Admissions deposit dates: 5 business days

Typical language exams: DELE

Entry requirements: PAES exam (mandatory); HS grades

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-3 months; students should apply ASAP to allow time for visa approval; required documents typically include proof of enrollment, financial documents, and no criminal record.

Common pitfalls: PAES is biggest challenge. Many student rely on specialized centers to prep.

COLOMBIA



HS graduation: NOV/DEC; JUN **University start date:** JAN; JUL

Typical admissions deadlines: Dependent on when national exam (ICFES) results released (2024 was JUN and NOV) Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution Admission release dates: Rolling from AUG-AUG Admissions deposit dates: DEC; JUN Typical language exams: SAT for some classes taught in English; B2 Spanish Entry requirements: Domestic: Saber 11 (ICFES) and national high school diploma; International: national leaving exams from Europe accepted at some; interview (for some programs)

Typical time to secure student visa: 3 business days

Note: All students must take an English-language proficiency exam to graduate from university; students study 8-9 subjects each semester; difficult to get to know professors or to get assistance from them for internships ; rare for a student to graduate "on time" as programs all penalty-free withdrawals until last weeks of course (students protect GPAs by dropping courses)

MEXICO

HS graduation: MAY/JUN **University start date**: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: Rolling, closes in MAY

Centralized admission portal: No

Admission release dates: 2 weeks (TEC de Monterrey) to 4 months

Admissions deposit dates: 30 days after decision

Typical language exams: B1 or B2 Spanish

Entry requirements: PAA or SAT; GPA min.; HS average of 80; resume for some

Typical time to secure student visa: 1 month

Common pitfalls: Student must apply to course; any student who studied high school in Mexico must have Mexican high school diploma to enter a Mexican university, no exceptions; programs reach capacity so apply early; deadlines mean everything needs to be approved, not just submitted; must be mindful of scholarship deadlines







HS graduation: NOV/DEC University start date: MAR/APR; AUG

Typical admissions deadlines: FEB (there are different rounds depending on a student's curriculum so a student must keep track of deadlines)

Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution

Admission release dates: Varies by institution, but typically 2-6 wks after deadline unless part of a specific round

Admissions deposit dates: 2-6 weeks

Typical language exams: B2 Spanish

Entry requirements: High school GPA, essays, interviews, university-specific entrance exams (each university has its own)

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-2 months; students should ensure they have all necessary documentation ready before applying, including proof of enrollment and financial support.

Common pitfalls: The interviews can be challenging; entrance exam formats can vary so students must focus preparation efforts wisely to not spread themselves too thin

AUSTRALIA

HS graduation: DEC

University start date: FEB/MAR; JUN/JUL; NOV

Typical admissions deadlines: NOV; MAY; SEP (rolling, apply early)

Centralized admission portal: No

Admission release dates: Rolling, 8 weeks after application

Admissions deposit dates: 48 hrs to 2 weeks (stated in offer letter)

Typical language exams: IELTS; PTE; CAE; OET; TOEFL iBT

Entry requirements: Australian Senior Secondary Certificate of Education (Year 12) or equivalent (U.S. HS diploma + SAT)

Typical time to secure student visa: 2 weeks



NEW ZEALAND

HS graduation: DEC

University start date: FEB; JUL

Typical admissions deadlines: DEC/JAN; MAY (rolling, apply early)

Centralized admission portal: No

Admission release dates: 2-4 weeks

Admissions deposit dates: Stated on offer letter

Typical language exams: IELTS; PTE; TOEFL

Entry requirements: Course dependent: 2-4 APs; SAT/ACT; HS diploma; min GPA

Typical time to secure student visa: 3 weeks



CZECHIA

HS graduation: JUN University start date: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: FEB-APR (Masaryk University: NOV-FEB for Czech-taught programs) **Centralized admission portal:** No

Admission release dates: End of JUN (Masaryk: Economics & Administration: within 2 months of app) Admissions deposit dates: Varies by institution

Typical language exams: Main language of instruction is Czech (CCE at B2 or C1 req'd); English-taught programmes are expanding (B2 level req'd)

Entry requirements: High school completion (student must meet Czech high school course requirements with their high school diploma); check specific requirements on each uni website; submit certified copies of diplomas, transcripts, and may need to provide letters of motivation, recommendation, or portfolios, depending on program. All students go through "nostrification" or will qualify through institutional accreditation of recognition of secondary education - see list <u>HERE</u> Note: Some universities have institutional accreditation and may recognize foreign secondary education as part of admission process (valid only for the particular university and faculty)



CZECHIA



Typical time to secure student visa: 60-90 days, but better to apply in advance

Common pitfalls: Missed deadlines; not providing required documents (certified transcripts or proof of language proficiency), high school coursework that isn't equivalent to Czech high school; starting visa process too late

Resources: <u>STUDY IN CZECHIA</u> and <u>Study in Prague</u>

FRANCE

HS graduation: JUL University start date: SEP

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Typical admissions deadlines: DEC 15

Centralized admission portal: Parcoursup for undergraduate programs for French, EU, and some int'l students; private unis require direct application; EEF platform in local Campus France office for all others (opens OCT 1)

Admission release dates: Within 1 month for program that requires an interview

Admissions deposit dates: MAY 31

Typical language exams: B2 min and C1 for competitive courses; TCF DAP recommended; DELF and DALF accepted

Entry requirements: HS Diploma equivalent to French Bacc; SAT/ACT, 3-5 APs, or IBDP (for U.S. students)

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-2 months, but 3 months recommended

GERMANY



HS graduation: MAY to JUL depending on state **University start date**: OCT (most common intake); APR (fewer programs)

Typical admissions deadlines: JUL 15 (for OCT start); JAN 15 (for APR start); verify deadlines as some int'l programs may set earlier deadlines

Centralized admission portal: Uni-assist.de is used by many institutions for int'l applications **Admission release dates:** 4-8 wks (public); within a few weeks (private); add 4-6 wks if applying via uni-assist.de

Admissions deposit dates: SEP-OCT (for OCT start); MAR-APR (for APR start); no deposit for public universities while private universities may have different requirements, including deposit payments. Typical language exams: German-taught programs: DSH (Deutsche Sprachprüfung für den Hochschulzugang), TestDaF (Test Deutsch als Fremdsprache), Goethe-Zertifikat C1 or C2, Telc Deutsch C1 Hochschule; English-taught programs: IELTS (6.0–7.0), TOEFL iBT (80–100)

GERMANY



Entry requirements: High school diploma equivalent to Abitur (requirements vary by country); US: 16 academic units min; three AP tests (3+); Numerus Clausus (NC): limited spots and requires high grades for admission; student can do a Studienkolleg (preparatory course) if their diploma does not meet the direct entry requirements

Typical time to secure student visa: 6-12 wks after document submission; students should apply at least 3 months before program start; required documents are: admission letter, proof of financial resources, health insurance, and proof of language proficiency.

Common pitfalls: Missed deadlines; submitting incorrect or incomplete documents (many need to be officially certified); not factoring in additional processing time with Uni-Assist applications; misunderstanding admission requirements; applying too late for a visa

Resources: <u>Abroader.EU</u> (search engine for English-taught public university programs); <u>DAAD</u> (German academic exchange service); <u>Uni-Assist</u> (central application platform for many universities) <u>Study in</u> <u>Germany</u> (official guide for international students); <u>Anabin</u> (check if diploma is recognized in Germany)

IRELAND

HS graduation: MAY

University start date: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: JAN (reduced fee); FEB (EU); MAY (EU - late); JUL (non-EU - late)

Centralized admission portal: Central Applications Office (CAO) for first year EU/EEA/UK applicants; direct admissions (non-EU)

- Admission release dates: JUL; AUG
- Admissions deposit dates: JUL; SEP

Typical language exams: Irish Leaving Certificate in English, GCSE English Language, University of Cambridge – Use of English Examination, TOEFL, IELTS, PTE

Entry requirements: Irish Leaving Certificate examinations, A levels, IBDP, US High School Diploma with SAT or ACT

Typical time to secure student visa: 4-8 weeks

Common pitfalls: Housing crisis in some areas (Dublin) and late decision date in relation to other countries



ITALY



HS graduation: JUN

University start date: SEP/OCT

Typical admissions deadlines: Non-EU - MAY; EU - JUL; important to check each program as some universities will have slightly different deadlines; some unis offer rolling admissions; privates as early as SEP

Centralized admission portal: EU - No, institution by institution; Non-EU - Universitaly should be used for pre-enrollment apps, but not all unis offer it

Admission release dates: APR-OCT , depending on rank

Admissions deposit dates: As early as mid-Aug (can be as short as 2 wks)

Typical language exams: B2 Italian; IELTS

Entry requirements: HS diploma; TOLCs, TILs, or TILCs (entrance exams for degree programs with limited spaces); IMAT - Non-EU medical school exam;

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-3 months

Common pitfalls: Some universities ask for fairly large deposits within 2 weeks of the decision release.
ITALY



Entry Requirements

Admission Tests: In addition to private universities that require admission tests, many public universities have admission tests for degree programs with limited spaces such as engineering, architecture, etc. These are often called TOLCs or TILs or TILCs. In addition to the high school diploma, they form the basis of the ranking that decides who is admitted and who is not.

Medical: Private medical school exams take place from Jan-Mar. The public medical school entrance exam for EU citizens is currently under discussion and dates have not been finalized for 2025. Non-EU citizens wishing to study in public medical schools must take the IMAT in September 2025. Some public universities require pre-registration in February 2025, in addition to the Universitaly pre-enrollment. It is a university by university process.

Exceptions? For Bocconi, Luiss, Politecnico di Torino, Politecnico di Milano, and a few other public universities, SAT scores can be an alternative to a university's entrance exam. Minimum scores are often indicated (1300 Politecnico di Torino, 1400-ish Bocconi, 1200 Luiss). Some very competitive AI and CS degree programs at public universities also look at SAT.





Entry Requirements

Foreign Diplomas: Any foreign diplomas, including IB, have to go through a process called the Declaration of Value to be approved as a credential. Some private universities skip this step, but there is no guarantee. The process is usually done through <u>CIMEA</u>.

US Diplomas: A student's HS diploma alone is not enough. They must have passed three Advanced Placement exams (IBs certificates are not accepted). In some cases, specific APs are required. Some universities allow a year of university study in lieu of the 3 APs.

Foundation Year Programs: These have begun to appear in English across Italy at state and private universities (Tor Vergata, La Sapienza, Pavia, Ca Foscari, Luiss Foundation Year, RUFA, ...).

Non-EU Students: Non-EU students generally have earlier deadlines due to visa processing and other documentation.
Specific Programs: Some unis or programs may have slightly different deadlines. Verify with the university's website!
Rolling Admissions: Rolling admissions or add'l deadlines may exist if there are available spots after the main rounds.

ITALY



What is Universitaly?

- A centralized pre-enrollment portal required for non-EU citizens who need visas
- Searchable database of bachelor's, master's, and doctoral programs across various Italian universities
- Filter by language of instruction (e.g., Italian or English) and discipline.
- Information on tuition fees, scholarships, and visa procedures is available
- Be patient with the filters it is a work in progress

How to Use Universitaly:

- Create an account on the Universitaly website
- Search for your desired program
- Submit your pre-enrollment application with the required documents
- Wait for the university's approval and then proceed with the visa process if necessary

Note: Some universities might also require direct applications through their own portals or systems. Always check the specific admission requirements for the university and program you are interested in.





Which English Proficiency Tests are Necessary for English-taught Programs in Italy?

SHORT ANSWER is a B-2 or IELTS 6.5, but some have slightly lower (Cattolica 6.0) and some higher.

Accepted English Proficiency Exams and Common Score Requirements:

- IELTS Overall band score: 6.0–7.0 (minimum 5.5 per section)
- TOEFL iBT 72-100
- Cambridge English Exams Cambridge B2 First (FCE): Grade B or higher; Cambridge C1 Advanced (CAE): Grade C or higher; Cambridge C2 Proficiency (CPE): Pass; PTE Academic - 59–65; Duolingo English Test - 95–120 (accepted by some)

Exemptions: Many universities waive the English proficiency requirement if:

- The applicant has completed previous education in English.
- The applicant is a native English speaker from countries like the USA, UK, Australia, or Canada.

Validity: English test scores are generally valid for 2 years from the test date.

ITALY



Is an Italian university right for a student?

Assessment Methods: Examinations (Oral and Written)

Oral examinations: significant part of the Italian system, especially in theoretical subjects like humanities, law, and some social sciences; typically involve face-to-face discussion where professor asks questions, and students respond verbally; Students assessed on understanding of material, critical thinking, and ability to articulate answers clearly

Written Exams: common for STEM and some social sciences; formats may be multiple-choice, problem-solving, essays, or short-answer questions; often test factual knowledge, application of concepts, and analytical skills

Project Work: required for many programs, particularly in fields like engineering, business, or IT; may involve research, group collaboration, or practical application of skills learned in the course

Written Papers (Essays/Reports): less common but some may require; more typical in humanities, social sciences, or PBL





Continuous Assessment: More common in modernized or internationalized programs

Final Thesis or Capstone Project: Most bachelor's programs in Italy conclude with preparation and defense of a final thesis (known as the tesi di laurea); demonstrates student's ability to conduct research and present findings effectively; usually shorter and less complex than a master's thesis

ITALY



Yearly Tuition Costs at Public Universities:

EU Citizens: Tuition fees for EU students at public universities typically range from €500 to €4,000 per year. The exact amount often depends on the specific university, program of study, and the student's family income. Many institutions offer income-based reductions, requiring students to submit financial documentation to determine the applicable fee.

Non-EU Citizens: Non-EU students may encounter different fee structures. Some universities implement a flat-rate system based on the student's country of origin and chosen field of study. Other institutions might have higher fees for non-EU students, sometimes reaching up to €6,500 annually, depending on the program and university.

Yearly Tuition Costs at Private Universities:

- Bocconi: approx €16,500
- LUISS: approx €12,500
- Cattolica: approx €6,000

*Not included: room, board, books, supplies, transportation, health insurance, visa costs, etc.

ITALY



Private University Tuition Due Dates:

Ones that offer early admission windows, often have an enrollment deposit deadline that can be as early as mid-autumn. This is the case for LUISS and Bocconi early admissions. Deposits are around 1200 euros and 3500 euros respectively, and are not advertised as refundable. Families often they pay the deposit to secure the spot. Other payment due dates are spaced throughout the year.

Public University Tuition Due Dates:

Tuition is commonly divided into multiple installments throughout the academic year.

NETHERLANDS

HS graduation: JUN/JUL University start date: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: Numerus fixus: JAN 15; Reg: APR 1 /MAY 1 (EU); DEC 1 and onwards for some university colleges

- Centralized admission portal: Studielink
- Admission release dates: APR 15 Ranking Day (numerus fixus); Reg: MAY/JUN
- Admissions deposit dates: Within 2 weeks of an offer
- Typical language exams: TOEFL, IELTS, CAE
- Entry requirements: Check country requirements in <u>NUFFIC</u>
- Typical time to secure student visa: 1-3 months

Common pitfalls: Some programs require submission of application within 14 days after registration with Studielink (UvA). Begin accommodation search early; don't wait for offer.

PORTUGAL

HS graduation: JUN University start date: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: 1st phase (EU) - FEB; 2nd phase (if spots avl) - APR-JUN; 3rd phase (still spots phases 1 and 2) - JUN/JUL

Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution and then course by course

Admission release dates: 1st phase (EU) - FEB;/MAR; 2nd phase - JUN; 3rd phase (still spots phases 1 and 2) - JUL/AUG

Admissions deposit dates: 1 month

Typical language exams: Letter from Portuguese teacher confirming level; CAPLE; CELPE-BRAS

Entry requirements: 1st phase - Exame Nacional Portugal (EU passport holders) - <u>equivalency chart for Exame Nacional</u> <u>Portugal</u>; ENEM (Brazil); IB (international or EU); 2nd phase - many more options

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-3 months

Common pitfalls: If an int'l student does not have a final HS transcript they have to apply in phase three, or gap.

Notes: Private universities tend to be a little more flexible with entry requirements







Typical admissions deadlines: Early: APR (public-UC3M); Rolling (private); Regular: JUN (public)

Centralized admission portal: Public: (step 1) <u>UNEDasiss</u>; (step 2) by region. Private: (step 1) university by university; (step 2) UNEDasiss

Admission release dates: JUL (public); Rolling (UC3M early, private)

Admissions deposit dates: JUL (public); within 2 weeks of an offer (UC3M & private)

Typical language exams: DELE, SIELE B1 level of Spanish (even for English-taught degrees); TOEFL 100-105; IELTS 7-7.5; Cambridge Advanced (C1) or Proficiency (C2); Duolingo (130)

Entry requirements: If no bilateral agreement/outside EU, UNEDasiss + EvAU/PCEs

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-3 months

Common pitfalls: If no agreement in place, long evaluation process for int'l students; admissions exam in Spanish; different application process in every region; short deposit window



HS graduation: JUN

University start date: SEP

Typical admissions deadlines: Varies by institution (important to verify each one), but typically APR

Centralized admission portal: No, institution by institution, canton by canton

Admission release dates: Up to 3 months

Admissions deposit dates: Weeks to a few months, check offer

Typical language exams: B2 (accepted)/C1 (preferred); few programs offered entirely in English

Entry requirements: Abitur; entrance exam (medicine); generally varies by university and student origen; CV; passport photo

Typical time to secure student visa: Visas are approved by each canton, so it varies

Common pitfalls: Application dates and admission process is highly variable due to cantons, so verify all dates and requirements; easier to get in than it is to graduate.



Swiss Education System



- There is no centralized Swiss system or curriculum. The country is comprised of 26 cantons (10 of which have universities) and each manages its own education system, entry requirements, and school calendar.
- <u>Universities</u>

Note: To enter university students have to earn a cantonal or federal maturité gymnasiale/Abitur.

Switzerland has two academic powerhouses, the two national universities:

- EPFL the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Lausanne (Lausanne)
- ETH Zürich Swiss Federal Institute of Technology (Zurich)



EPFL Entry Dates and Requirements

Deadline: Mid-November to April 30th, documents required by April 30th

Requirements: EPFL limits the number of students in the first year of the Bachelor's programs to 3000. Students repeating the first year, holders of a Swiss maturité gymnasiale, and those who have successfully completed the CMS or entrance exam are guaranteed to be accepted. <u>Consult the website</u> for the long list of requirements. Upper secondary school certificates from a country that is not a member of EU, EFTA, nor UK have to take a <u>difficult entrance exam in</u> <u>French (sample)</u>.

Language: B2 French accepted, C1 preferred

Notification: Holders of an upper secondary school-leaving certificate from a country that is a member of EU, EFTA, or UK or of an International Baccalaureate (IB) will be accepted at the beginning of August within the places available. The general average (or total number of points scored) of the school-leaving certificate will be used to rank and select the applicants.

ETH Entry Dates and Requirements

Deadline: Without entrance exam: Dec 1 – Mar 31st; With exam: Take the exam Dec - Jan

Requirements: Requirements by country of origin can be found <u>here</u>.

Language: B2 German accepted, C1 preferred

Notification: Within 8 weeks

In addition, four of the following subjects must have been taken during the last three years of high school: physics, chemistry, biology, computer science, another language, geography, history, economics. Otherwise: Comprehensive Entrance Examination ETHZ

Basel

Upper secondary school-leaving certificate + Advanced Placement tests including 6 independent general education subjects, each with a minimum grade of 3: 1. First language (native language); 2. Second language; 3. Mathematics/calculus; 4. Natural sciences (biology, chemistry or physics); 5. Humanities and social sciences (geography, history or economics/law) and 6. Elective: one subject from category 2, 4 or 5 or computer science or philosophy. Computer science and philosophy can only be chosen as a sixth subject. All required achievements must have been acquired entirely and exclusively within the US American education system.

Bern, Fribourg, Geneve, Lausanne, Luzern, Neuchâtel, St Gallen, USI and Zürich

Upper secondary school-leaving certificate + Advanced Placement tests including 6 independent general education subjects, each with a minimum grade of 3: 1. First language (native language); 2. Second language; 3. Mathematics/calculus; 4. Natural sciences (biology, chemistry or physics); 5. Humanities and social sciences (geography, history or economics/law) and 6. Elective: one subject from category 2, 4 or 5 or computer science or philosophy. Computer science and philosophy can only be chosen as a sixth subject. **Note:** St Gallen additionally has HSG selection procedure

Applied Sciences and Arts Universities (UASAs)

The ten applied sciences universities require the specialized maturité. Most also require one

year of work experience or apprenticeship prior to entry.

Typical time to secure student visa: 3 weeks

Admissions deposit dates: MAY 1

Typical language exams: TOEFL, IELTS, DET, IB, IGCSE English*, CAE, PTE, CAEL

*Quebec unis require intermediate level French by graduation

Entry requirements: High school diploma; min GPA, US HS Diploma + SAT + APs^{*}, A Levels, IBDP , French Bac, etc.

Typical time to secure student visa: 3 months

Common pitfalls: Check each university's program requirements as it all depends on the program (not the university); be mindful of ethnic concentrations

- Typical admissions deadlines: Early: OCT/NOV, Reg: JAN, Rolling
- **Centralized admission portal:** Common App, Coalition App, UC App, Cal State Apply, Questbridge, Texas, SUNY
- Admission release dates: Early: Mid- DEC-JAN, Reg: MAR/APR
- Admissions deposit dates: May 1
- Typical language exams: TOEFL, IELTS, DET, CAE, PTE
- Entry requirements: HS Diploma, min GPA, APs, A Levels, IBDP, French Bac, etc., SAT/ACT required by some unis
- Typical time to secure student visa: 2-5 months depending on the country
- Common pitfalls: Admission data can be misleading

Centralized admission portal: Korean University Admission System (Korean Universities generally use a common portal)

Admission release dates: Early: NOV, Reg: JAN/FEB

Admissions deposit dates: Early: FEB 1

Typical language exams: TOEFL, IELTS, TOPIK (for Korean language proficiency)

Entry requirements: High school diploma, TOPIK scores for Korean language programs, English proficiency test scores for English-based programs

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-2 months

Common pitfalls: Language requirements for non-native Korean speakers; understanding the competitive

Typical time to secure student visa: 1-2 months

Common pitfalls: Gaokao results are critical; foreign students may find the application process bureaucratic

Typically joint programs with Western institutions (Duke Kunshan, NYU Shanghai, Nottingham Ningo) or special English-language tracks:

<u>The Shanghai Jiao Tong University - Antai College of Economics and Management (ACEM)</u> - business administration and economics

The Beijing Foreign Studies University (BFSU) - several undergraduate programs in English related to international relations, business, and other disciplines

Zhejiang University International College - engineering, international relations, and environmental studies

South China University of Technology - business, engineering, and architecture, among others

<u>Soochow University (Suzhou)</u> - business and management courses

Xi'an Jiaotong-Liverpool University (XJTLU) - engineering, business, and computer science

Note: You'll need HSK level 5 (highest levels) + 2 months in China to feel confident in these programs and in life.
