A WARM MESSAGE FROM: MARSHA OSHIMA VP FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, IACAC COUNSELOR, INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL OF GENEVA

Greetings from Switzerland!

I am honored and tickled to be invited to contribute to your mentorship year first newsletter.

As a brief introduction, I am currently a university counselor at the International School of Geneva, La Grande Boissière campus. This is my 11th year as a counselor, but I have been in international education



for over 25 years, working for many years at the Institute of International Education on a variety of exchange and scholarship programs before life took an unexpected turn and my spouse transferred to Switzerland.

Full confession, I have only been an official mentor once in the first year of the MYP and I have never had a formal mentor. But I feel that my career path has been full of mentors. I have experienced mentorship in different ways: through previous supervisors and senior staff, through peers and in reverse from those I have supervised. As a new counselor in 2013, the generosity of my colleague in the office and others in the counseling network was definitely mentorship that built my skills. It's a two way exchange, with the mentor role opening the door, while the mentee needs to be proactive in asking questions and making first attempts to upskill.

The adage of learning to fish rather than being given the fish is how I view a successful mentoring experience. Another way to seek informal mentorship is by volunteering with International ACAC. Just because you may be newish to the field does not mean you cannot get involved. For example, you can organize a conference panel proposal based on a topic you want to learn about, be the moderator and approach experts (who may become potential mentors!) to serve as the speakers. Apply to join a committee where you will work with a great cross-section of members. Even a few hours volunteering at a college fair can help make those first introductions that lead to more meaningful exchanges.

Final thought is to **be mindful of paying it forward.** Seeing the number of MYP mentees who then become mentors is a wonderful example. Small gestures can have a big impact: the friendly message to a new colleague at a nearby school, grabbing a coffee with someone who approaches you after a presentation, or exchanging contact info with someone who asked a thought provoking question during a webinar. All of these could be the start of an incredible mentoring relationship.
