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# Crafting an Effective Letter of Recommendation

- Content Strategies
  - Personalization: Tailor letters to individual students
  - Use specific examples: Highlight academic performance, classroom behavior, contributions, and leadership
  - Address areas of growth in a constructive manner
  - Aligning key traits and achievements with the student's overall application and chosen field
  - Highlighting student involvement beyond the classroom, if applicable

- Structure
  - Clear organization: Introduction, body (with examples and analysis), and conclusion
  - Strong, positive language that reflects confidence in the student
  - Avoid vague descriptors and generic phrases



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# Navigating Common • Uncooperative teachers

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### **Proactive Approaches for Counselors**

- Building a strong recommendation culture
- Offering <u>workshops</u>, timelines and reminders
  - Following up with teachers to ensure deadlines are met and quality is maintained
- Providing successful letter samples
- Showing appreciation

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# **Ensuring the Best Possible Representation for**

- Encouraging early discussions between teachers, students, and counselors
  - Are students asking teachers to write?
  - If students are completing brag sheets, should they meet with teachers?
- Advocating for the importance of recommendation letters in shaping a student's application
- Offering feedback on drafts and providing suggestions for improvement



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# Role Play

- Teacher: You have known the student for two years, but they are not engaged in class and you do not have a personal relationship with them. You are busy with class prep and are not vested in the letter process.
- **College Counselor**: You want to suggest ways to include concrete examples of when the student was successful, and focus less on the ECs. Your goal is to help motivate the teacher so that they are more open to representing the student in a better way.

In my classes they have been moderately successful and in science, they earned scores that are usually quite good. They are learning the basics at this point. On the more recent materials they are struggling but I am expecting to see some improvement. I understand that his focus in university is engineering, so I am sure that they will make more efforts to understand the material in order to be better prepared for the demanding coursework.

Prior to his joining my class I did not know they were so involved in biological science related EC activities. I am told that they participated in a competition. So their interests are quite varied as their brag sheet I have read has attested to, but I can only really speak on the things they have done above with any degree of personal knowledge.

I believe they are a capable student and could be successful in situations in which they are determined to do well. If they want to study engineering, and is serious about it, they will make it happen.

### Role Play

- **Teacher**: You have known the student for two years. You're not sure how to best articulate their strengths.
- College Counselor: You want to suggest ways to include concrete examples, personal anecdotes, and connections between the student's class performance and their potential for success in college. Your goal is to help the teacher strengthen their letter so that it stands out to admissions officers.

### **Practical Tips for Strong Recommendations**

- Use specific examples
- Tailor letters to specific colleges when possible
- Highlight unique attributes
- Align letter's content with the student
- Remember: the letter is about the student, not the recommender
