In this position, I am responsible for coordinating the academic area of the program, focusing on student-centered objectives. My work involves reviewing the academic load against the curriculum

I diligently monitor students' academic behavior, implements measures to prevent dropout rates, and provides career counseling for graduating students. Being the sole school counselor at my school, I support 797 students from grades 7 to 12, including 119 final-year students. My journey into counseling began with a deep pas-

sion for helping students find the right educational paths, even in an environment where resources for guidance are limited. Through my guidance, students have successfully applied to universities worldwide, gaining scholarships and financial aid. Beyond counseling, I actively engage in professional development, participating in international programs to bring back valuable insights to my students and fellow educators. My dedication to my work stems from a belief that access to the right information and mentorship can transform lives.

I applied to be an IACAC Scholar because I see this as an invaluable opportunity to expand my knowledge, build a network with experienced professionals, and bring back best practices to my students. Founded in 2019, KIA is the only private

international school in Burundi with need-blind admissions and full financial aid, offering a transformative education to bright, ambitious students from low-income backgrounds. Genevieve joined KIA in its second year, teaching a variety of courses and helping to lay the groundwork for the school's development. Over the past three years, she has developed the school's college pathways initiative, working to overcome challenges of resources and access.

With a background in education and college access, including a fellowship in Rwanda and experience at a nonprofit in New York, Genevieve has supported KIA's mission of cultivating ethical leaders and critical thinkers. She has guided students to universities in

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Africa and the U.S., often with full financial aid. In her current role, she oversees college preparation, builds partnerships with universities and funders, and works to expand opportunities for KIA's students, who are driven to learn and contribute to Burundi's future. Through her work, Genevieve strives to empower students to access world-class education and bring their skills back to their communities, aligning with KIA and VHW's shared vision of creating lasting change.
