## Facts and figures

- 125,000+ international students in the Netherlands
- #1 country in Europe in English proficiency
- 400+ English-taught bachelor's programmes
- 1200+ English-taught master's programmes
- 14 Research Universities including 3 technical universities, 1 agricultural university and 10 university colleges
- 40 Universities of Applied Science



Systemic pressures created a challenging environment for institutions, students, staff and the public.



## How is geopolitics shaping the landscape?

- The Netherlands has become very popular pause on recruitment requested in 2022
- Internationalisation in Balance bill introduced in parliament discussion/lobbying to the present (no official outcome yet)
- Outcomes to date: some changes made by the universities themselves
  - Fewer new programmes in English to be launched
  - Groningen and Maastricht phased out English-taught BSc Medicine programmes
  - Small number of other programmes followed suit: i.e. BSc Biomedical Sciences at VU
  - Focus on preparing students for the Dutch labour market (including language acquisition)
  - Beethoven project launches focus on technical programmes
- What else? 1 billion Euro budget but to higher education: will affect services, possibly new programmes
- What are we seeing? Increases in interest and application as other areas of the world experience difficulties.
- What's next?




## **Higher Education Philosophy**

- Access to education for all
- Highly standardized education system
- Right fit:
  - Personal characteristics, logistics, typical items for fit
  - Plus: different educational options for different skills and goals



## **Dutch Higher Education System**



#### **RU: Research University**

Academic education

### **UAS: University of Applied Sciences**

Professional higher education

#### MBO: vocational education

- Preparation for a wide range of jobs: hair dressing, construction work, shop assistant, etc.
- Not offered in English



## **Binary System**



#### **RU: Research University**

- Includes University Colleges
- Academic education

### **UAS: University of Applied Sciences**

Professional higher education

Differences are getting smaller, but they are still an important distinction.

- Like critical thinking and in-depth discussion
- Can get through high volumes of material
- Thrive in a fast-paced environment
- Are able to work well independently
- Are considering completing a Master's degree or even PhD
- University Colleges...



### Academic Fit – UC's



#### Facts:

- Same characteristics as the main Research University, but different
- Most research universities have a University College
- Most are honours colleges
- Many are residential
- Liberal Arts and Sciences programmes

Living and learning style influenced by the US and UK systems:

#### **US** Influence:

- Flexible curriculum
- Multi/interdisciplinary approach

#### UK Influence:

- Small-scale college within a larger institution
- Focus on extra-curricular activities and community



### The Admissions Process





## Eligibility Check

## Diplomas *generally accepted* for **Research Universities**

- International Baccalaureate diploma
- GCE certificate: 3 Academic A-levels (grades A\*-C)
- US high school diploma + 3 or 4 AP courses, sometimes minimum GPA required
- European secondary school diploma which gives access to university in your home country
- 40+ other international diplomas

### Diplomas generally accepted for Universities of Applied Sciences

Almost all diplomas accepted by RU, including:

- IBDP and IBCP
- BTEC level 3
- GCSE certificate + 2 AS-levels
- US high school diploma (check per programme)
- European secondary school diploma which gives access to university in your home country



## Further requirements?

Check if the program has further requirements\*

- Subject requirements (must match HAVO and VWO profiles)
- Minimum scores required
- English language requirements
- ....other requirements?




## Further requirements?

### \*Mathematics

- In most cases, math to senior level is sufficient for many programmes – business, social sciences and science/technical programmes may have additional requirements
- IB AI SL/HL recognition
  - Most programmes accept all levels of IB math
  - Math AA likely to be required: Business, Engineering, Data Science, Natural Sciences
  - Math AA may be required, or may be suggested: Social sciences (Psychology, Political science, Anthropology/Sociology)
  - Association of Math Teachers has assessed both levels and made suggestions, but each university programme can make their own decisions
- Deficiencies? Options: Boswell Beta exams, OMPT various levels



### The Admissions Process





## Matching...is not selection

- Checks whether the program is a good fit for the student and vice versa
- Takes place after eligibility check (but this may not be obvious for students)
- Usually an in-depth activity, can be as simple as a CV or survey
- Can be mandatory to take part
- Non-binding advice
- Underlying goal: better match between program & students to reduce dropout rates




## Selection after the gate

- Easier (?) to get in, must put in the work to stay in!
- Binding Study Advice
  - → Students must achieve the number of study points required per university programme to move on to second year
  - → Sometimes 45 out of 60 sometimes up to 60 out of 60
- Right fit students generally make it!
- In-programme advisers there for support throughout the year



### The Admissions Process





### Selection

- Approximately 20% of programmes have a selection process
- Three types of selective programmes:
  - 1. Talent-based
    - academics + showcasing talent
  - 2. Small-scale and intensive (University Colleges, hotelschools)
    - programmes with a high staff to student ratio and a high concentration of contact hours
    - holistic or aptitude/skill-based admissions
  - 3. Numerus Fixus capped numbers



### Selection

#### **Numerus Fixus:**

- Highly popular programs with many more applications than places
- Examples: medicine, psychology, physiotherapy, business (note: Not all programs in a field are always Numerus Fixus at all institutions)
- Limit of 2 applications in Studielink (1 in case of some programs: medicine, physiotherapy, dental care)
  - Maximum of 3 application attempts in a lifetime to the same NF subject/programme
- Early and very strict application deadline: January 15
- Strict application & offer acceptance procedures
- Selection based on 2 or more clearly outlined criteria
- Programmes with a Numerus Fixus can change from year to year check prior to application

Every NF ranking is determined by different criteria but typically include:

- Minimum GPA (& subject) requirements
- Aptitude test(s) or assignment(s)
- Motivation (written or interview) and/or CV

The weight of each requirement is also determined per programme.

BUT some programmes have unweighted lotteries...



## Two-step application process

- Centralized national registration system
- Almost all programs start with registration in Studielink, but not all
- Most universities require students to submit an application in their own application system Osiris, uSis, MyUM, Embark, and others)
- Students need to <u>read and follow</u> the instructions per program
- Check deadlines! Dec 1-July 1





### Cost of attendance

### Fees are based on nationality, not residency\*

- EU/EEA subsidized tuition fees; determined by Dutch government
- Non-EU/EEA higher tuition fees but still competitive; determined by institution

### Tuition fees 2026-2027 Academic year\*\*

Non-EU/EEA: € 6,000 - € 22,000

EU/EEA: € 2,695
 Exceptions: Some specialty programmes have higher fees, up to €6,000

### Few scholarships/funding available

- Check per programme
- Mostly tuition fee waivers
- Full scholarships extremely rare
- Tuition fee loan for Dutch & EEA/EU students
   (DUO)
- If EEA/EU students work a minimum of 32 hours per month they are eligible (loans, grants, public transport cards, etc.)



<sup>\*</sup> In some cases permanent EU residents qualify for EU subsidized fees; check with institution when applying \*\* fees are subject to change


## Housing

- •It is the student's responsibility to find housing\*
- Housing is not owned or managed by universities, but large organisations or private landlords
- Many different types of facilities dorms and meal plans are not typical
- •Costs vary significantly depending on city and facilities €400-1400 Euro/month
- Demand is significantly more than supply of rooms chronic shortages across the country
- Students should start EARLY, make it a PRIORITY

\*exception is residential programmes such as some University Colleges and a small number of other programmes
