 - National Exam Results/Predictions
 - Standardized Tests
 - ACT or SAT
- Letters of Recommendation
- Personal Achievements, Talents, and Activities
- Personal & Supplemental Essays
- Application Plans: Early Decision, Early Action Regular Decision

Holistic Admissions & Context: Your Authentic Story

- What does holistic admissions mean?
- How do admissions officers at highly selective Liberal Arts Colleges review applications?
- Conveying your voice Personal Statement/College Essay vs. Statement of Purpose
- Conveying why you think the way you do and your perspective



Tips for Telling Your Authentic Story

- Don't copy stories or essays from online, or rely on Chat GPT/AI.
- Don't try to be unique. Be true to the experiences that are important *to you*.
- Share multiple parts of yourself throughout your application.
- Think about which parts of the application would serve best where.
- Supplementary essays
 - They are not intended to be more work for you
 - Colleges are intentional in selecting these questions
